

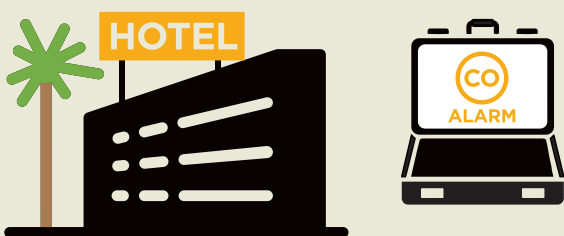


Travel Safe

PACK A CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARM WHEN YOU GO

1 HOTELS/VACATION RENTALS

- In most states, hotels and vacation rentals are not required to install CO alarms
- Remember to take a portable CO alarm along when traveling



CO Sources: Gas appliances, attached parking garages, fireplaces, gas powered construction/maintenance equipment

2 RVs/TENTS

- Install/maintain CO alarms* in RVs; pack a battery-powered alarm for use in a tent
- Never use a charcoal grill inside a tent or RV
- Always operate gas generators as far away as possible from tents + RVs



CO Sources: RV exhaust, gas BBQs, charcoal grills, fuel burning equipment (campstoves, heaters, lanterns), gas generators, LP gas appliances

3 BOATS

- Install CO alarms* in enclosed areas of a boat
- Seat children in forward areas, away from exhaust
- Do not let anyone swim under or around the swim platform—CO can build up to dangerous levels in this area and be fatal in seconds
- Always wear a life jacket



CO Sources: Engine exhaust, gas generators, gas appliances, portable gas heaters

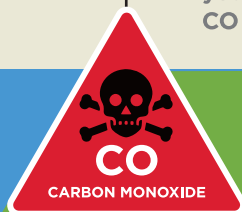
4 OTHER PLACES
